Search for window on a brutal war

A HUNT is on for missing sections of a diary detailing the harrowing experiences of a nurse who served on the Western Front during the First World

Edith (Edie) Appleton moved to the Island in the early 1920s and stayed at Buddlebrook House, Brighstone, until her death in 1958. She worked as a nurse for the duration of

the war and described her memories of work-ing close to the Western Front in a diary, which she kept between 1914 and into 1919.

Her great nephew, Dick Robinson, who lives in Gloucestershire, had the diaries passed on to him and decided to have the stories pub-

He set up a website about them and Edie's life in 2008 and extracts from the diaries were published by the BBC in 2009. They have also been turned into a book, A Nurse at the Front, the Great War Diaries of Sister Edith Appleton, which was published this year, in association with the Imperial War Museum.

However, some extracts of the diary are still missing and Dick is planning to visit the IW in July in the hope of finding someone who may
